Chronology

- ❑ 1987 Diagnosed with PD
- ❑ 2001 Cognitive decline and visual hallucinations
- ❑ Jan 2002 referred by GP to Consultant in Old age Psychiatry Oxleas NHS Trust
- ❑ 2002 Also being seen in Parkinson's clinic at QE Hospital
- ❑ Out patients Oxleas
- ❑ Memory clinic Oxleas
- ❑ Supported at home by CMHN Oxleas
- ❑ 7th April 2003 seen in the 1st joint PD/MH clinic and supported by this service until death in September 2005

Symptoms

- ❑ Classic symptoms of PD in early stages
- ❑ Gradual cognitive decline (fluctuating)
- ❑ Fluctuating mental state with hallucinations and delusional ideas
- ❑ Recurrent UTI's with increased confusion requiring 3 admissions to QE Hospital

Treatment

- Medication
 - Sinemet
 - Rivastigmine
 - Quetiapine increasing to 175mgs daily
- Late 2004 -indwelling catheter following urinary retention and numerous infections

Support

- ❑ Carer's Education Group
- ❑ Reminiscence Group
- ❑ Respite
- ❑ Day Care

- ❑ Idiopathic Parkinson's disease
- ❑ Neocortical Lewy body disease
